

Europe (English)

- A: Draw and label a knight (e.g. armour, chainmail).
- B: Read a book on castles. Write down three new facts you have learnt and any questions you have. Don't forget your question mark!
- C: Choose a castle to research and create a fact file on it. Don't forget capital letters and full stops.

North America (SMSC)

- A: Describe the social hierarchy of a castle. Who are the most important people?
- B: Write 5 rules for living in a castle. E.g. *You must... You must not...*
- C: Many castles had their own chapels to worship in. What did they look like? Draw and label the features of a chapel.

Asia (Personal Development)

- A: Design a bedroom fit for a lord, lady, prince or princess.
- B: Can you create your own castle or 'den' outside using recycled materials?
- C: Use a paint computer programme to design and create your own castle. Can you label the main features?

Towers and Turrets British Values – Democracy

Antarctica (Topic: Geography & DT)

- A: Draw a sketch map of Kenilworth Castle. Can you label features you see? E.g. draw bridge. You could view the castle on Google Earth to help!
- B: Research a castle in the UK. What city or town is it located in? What human and physical features does the town or city have?
- C: Castle food in medieval times would often include expensive meat. Help your grown up prepare a 'Sunday roast' fit for a king.

Africa (Maths)

- A: Create castle turrets using rolled up paper or cardboard tubes. Order them from the shortest to the tallest.
- B: Create and measure castle turrets using non-standard measures of bricks/cubes/tins etc. How many items high are they?
- C: Imagine that a room in your house is a room in a medieval castle. Walk around the the room and count the number many footsteps?

South America (Healthy Schools)

- A: Research the materials used to make different parts of a castle.
- B: Knights needed to train hard to be ready for battle. Can you create a training programme for a knight?
- C: A trebuchet was used to protect the castle. Can you create your own trebuchet and measure how far you can project a missile using it?

Australasia (Topic: Art & Design and History)

- A: Research Warwick Castle. How old is it? What was it used for?
- B: Create a self-portrait that you could hang in your own castle.
- C: Draw and colour your own castle. Make sure you include features such as a turret, a tower and a moat.
